OUR LORD HAS EXPECTATIONS

"Brethren, having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; if service, in our serving; he who teaches, in his teaching; he who exhorts, in his exhortation; he who contributes, in liberality; he who gives aid, with zeal; he who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness. Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with brotherly affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Never flag in zeal, be aglow with the Spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in your hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints, practice hospitality. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them." Romans 12:6-14

St. Paul's epistle to the Orthodox Catholic Church in Rome was a type of behavior guideline for the parishioners there. In this article, I will look at our Lord's expectations in St. Paul's epistle and offer a short summarized explanation.

As Christians, we must use the gifts God has given us to their fullest potential in our lives and parish life. This is Christ's expectation. Anything short of this is missing the mark of our high calling. When we miss the mark, we sin. In sin, we harm ourselves and we harm others. So, we must use all of Christ's blessings well.

- How do we use the gift of prophecy? We know our faith. We live it and teach it. We live our faith through prayer, fasting, and reading. We never stop learning about it. We preserve what we learn and pass it on unadulterated. We know our faith and live our faith in complete loving openness and obedience to the Holy Spirit's inspiration. This takes dedication on our part.
- How do we serve? Just as Jesus did. He is the model we follow. There is no other if we call ourselves Christians. The gospels are full of the many ways in which Jesus served His fellow humans. Our vocation is to emulate His examples. To learn to serve like Jesus, we must read the gospels over and over again. We must pray to Christ to teach us how to serve Him and others.
- How are we to teach? We teach and speak the truth with love and without compromise. Truth does not belong to us. Truth is not malleable. Truth is eternal and it comes from God. Giving truth to others is sacred. We must always treasure and protect the truth because the lives of our eternal souls, and other immortal souls, depend on knowing and living according to God's truth.
- How do we exhort or appeal to fellow parishioners? We must do so with genuine love for them. Our exhortation must be faithful to Jesus' teachings. We don't appeal to our opinions or subjective beliefs. We appeal to the truth once and forever delivered to the Apostles as written in the Holy Bible and lived in Holy Tradition.

The minimum is 10% of our annual income (Matthew 23:23). This is a tithe. On top of this, Jesus expects us to do offerings. If we are not where Jesus wants us to be in our giving we must acknowledge that our Lord will help us get there if we want to. It's His expectation for us. We are to give sincerely, sacrificially, and lovingly. We give to change our souls regardless of any other factors in the parish. The gospels make clear that Jesus had issues with temple and synagogue leaders. Jesus also had issues with some of their parishioners. He still gave 100%. Our Lord is only asking 10% of us. Our parish is a fortified ark

"With God, all things are possible." Matthew 19:26

that carries us over the stormy seas of life. Just as we would never be overly concerned who is the captain of a ferry boat, or who the crew on a ferry boat are, or even the people who are on the ferry boat, if we needed to cross the waters, we would get on the ferry boat regardless of those other factors. The same is true of our parish. We love and support it because this is where we have chosen to have Jesus save us.

- How are we to give aid to others? With zeal. When we see our fellow parishioners and neighbors suffering, we are to have a natural sense of urgency to action to alleviate their suffering and need. If we don't, we need to repent and work on ourselves. St. Chrysostom says we will never find Christ in Holy Communion if we don't first embrace Him in the needs of others. Jesus says, "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me" (Matthew 25:40). If we don't help those in need, we fail Jesus.
- How are we to be merciful? In cheerfulness. Mercy means we give someone something they don't deserve. Mercy is reserved for the guilty. Justice is for the innocent. Considering we are all sinners and in need of Christ's forgiveness, we extend our Savior's mercy to those who hate us and those who love us. Christ commands us to love everyone (Matthew 5:44 and John 13:44). This is not an option.
- How are we to love genuinely? Look how Jesus loved others in the gospels. Christ's love is the example we follow. It's all there for us to read about. His love was selfless, faithful, truthful, empathetic, healing, challenging, and forgiving. If we don't love as Christ loves, we need to make serious changes in our lives to get there. It is Christ's expectation of us.
- How do we hate what is evil? As Christians, we must detest all ungodliness and wickedness. Christ publicly taught people to reject the lies of men and live for the truths of God. We must take a stand for the truths of our Lord openly and with courage just as Jesus did. The Light of Christ is to shine through our lives for all to see. Our Lord died for this cause. Jesus is the example we follow.
- How do we hold fast to what is good? We sincerely endeavor to keep the commandments of God as best we can. We strive to follow them better and more spiritually as we progress in becoming more Christlike. We replace vice with virtue.
- How do we love one another with brotherly affection? We forgive each other as a parish family of Christians. We try to have relationships with each other because this is what Christ wants. We come to church to be with Christ, and each other, united in the bond of the sacred Eucharist. We honor Christ as the head of our family and we take seriously His command that we become one just as He and the Father are one (John 10:30). If we don't come to church regularly, this will never be a reality for us. And if this is not our reality, it needs to be according to Jesus.
- How do we outdo one another in showing honor to each other? Humility. Accepting that Christ is the head of our family and He wants us to do this. Our obedience to Christ is founded in the ten commandments. We honor Jesus' expectations. We make our lives more about others and less about ourselves. When we see a fellow brother or sister doing good we praise their righteous deeds.
- How do we never flag others with zeal? We should almost always mind our own business. We stop gossiping. We worry about our own salvation and stay in our lane. Spiritually, we see ourselves as the worst sinners while seeing everyone else as more spiritually advanced. We are to be humble, realizing every time we point at someone's faults there are three fingers pointing back at us. Jesus tells us to see the log in our own eye before we point out the speck in a brother or sister's eye (Matthew 7:3). If we have to correct someone, we should generally do it without passion and with genuine concern. First privately, with a few others if necessary, and lastly before the entire assembly as a last resort. This is in the gospel and commanded by Jesus (Matthew 18:15-17).
- How do we glow with the Spirit? We live according to the teachings of the Spirit. We pray and read about our faith every day. We make Church a top priority in our lives. We live in faithful synergy with the sacraments. We make room for the Spirit in our minds and hearts to transform us to be more Christlike.
- How do we serve the Lord? We fully surrender our lives to His mission on earth in order to acquire the Kingdom of heaven for us and for others.

- How do we rejoice in our hope? We realize that Christ has saved us. This is our joy. Jesus loves us and we love Jesus and we love each other. This world is dying but Christ is Risen! We place all our hope in our Lord.
- How are we patient in tribulation? We never doubt Christ's love and we accept with absolute faith that everything our Lord does, He does for our salvation. We must believe God loves us. If Christ suffered, we too will suffer. We must accept that we will suffer for Christ and His truth (John 15:18).
- How are we constant in prayer? We pray every day and at set times. We live out a rule of prayer. We do this because it is our daily communion with Christ. If we love Jesus, we set aside time for Him every day. To pray to Christ is to be His friend. Prayer is our communication with our Lord.
- How do we contribute to the needs of the saints? We give as Christ asks us to the parish and we keep the church open and the sacraments flowing so people's lives can be forever changed. Immortal souls only become saints through living a life for Christ in their parish or monastery.
- How do we practice hospitality? We practice it by being gracious hosts when called to do so in the parish and in our homes. We give sacrificially and in thanksgiving from the abundance that we have been given.
- How do we bless those who persecute us? We don't curse them. We sincerely pray for them in our daily prayers and ask Jesus to bless them. We light candles for them. We commemorate them in the Eucharist. We offer an artoclasia for them. We do all things in order for our enemies to be saved and to no longer live "rent-free" in our minds.

None of these things are easy, but with God, all things are possible (Matthew 19:23-26)!

YOUTH MESSAGE: THE CHURCH CALENDAR & THE VIRGIN MARY

Hello Dayton Annunciation Family,

As those of you who attended Vacation Church School at St. Paul's this summer may remember, the Church calendar is closely tied to the life of the Virgin Mary. Just last month, on the 15th of August we celebrated the Virgin Mary's Dormition or falling asleep. That was the last of the major feasts of the Church calendar.

On September 1st we celebrate the New Year in the Church, and the cycle of feasts begins again. The first major feast of this month and new Church year is the Nativity (or birth) of the Virgin Mary, the Theotokos. This feast is on the 8th of September every year, which means it falls on a Wednesday this year.



The reason we, as Orthodox Christians, honor so deeply the Theotokos is because it was through her Christ God came into the world. Everything that happens in the life of Christ - His being born, His teachings, His healings, and ultimately His Death on the Cross and Resurrection are brought to us through the Virgin Mary. She said "yes" when the Archangel Gabriel announced that she could be the mother of God. This was a very brave thing for her to do.

Look around the church next time you are here for Liturgy. See how many different icons there are in which she appears. Look at the biggest icon in the church, (hint it's right up front), and see who is depicted. Some people (who are not Orthodox Christian) think that we honor the Virgin Mary too much. But, since we know that Jesus is God, and that Mary is the Mother of Jesus, we know that we should celebrate her for all she gave us. We even sing hymns every Sunday saying that she is more glorious than the angels of heaven!

This is why the Orthodox Church has the calendar is so closely tied to Virgin Mary. It is another way of giving her honor, of acknowledging her glory, and reverencing her life. One way you might want to celebrate the Nativity of the Virgin Mary this year is to take a tradition your family does for each other on birth-day's and do that for the her. You can sing to her icon, or say a pray to her at a special dinner. However your family celebrates birthdays you can do that for the Theotokos too! We here at Dayton Annunciation are having liturgy on the morning of the 8th and I encourage you all to Honor her by being in attendance.

May the Prayers of Theotokos be with you always!

September. Traditionally school would start sometime close to Labor Day which is celebrated on September 6. Most children these days will have already started their school year in mid to late August. No matter when or how (online or in person) your children start school, be as safe as possible in these uncertain times. September 22, the Fall Equinox, is the official first day of fall. Leaves turning. Life starts to slow down and tuck in for the winter months. For gardeners: Divide perennial flowers such as daylilies, irises, and peony. Begin planting spring blooming bulbs, like daffodil, at the end of the month. Take cuttings of annual flowers to root and overwinter indoors. Begonia, coleus, geranium, impatiens, and lantana can be propagated for growing outdoors next spring. Pick and preserve flowers, seed heads, and pods for dried arrangements. Collect annual and perennial seeds for sowing next year.

MISSIONS & OUTREACH

We are called by Christ to "love your neighbor as yourself." As a community here at Dayton Annunciation we have to ask ourselves: "If I couldn't feed myself over the weekend, or afford all of the clothes or products needed for my kids, what would I hope people would do for me?"

The Missions and Outreach committee has brought forth to the community ways to live out the Gospel here in Dayton. These are opportunities that do not require much time out of our week but bring us closer to Christ by doing as we are called in His Gospel.



One outreach project is the *Kettering Backpack Program* which strives to feed hungry children in the city of Kettering over the weekend. Children with limited food at home are able to receive breakfast and lunch at school. Over the weekend, they do not have the same availability. The Kettering Backpack Program provides discreet bags of food to children every Friday for consumption over the weekend. There are two ways our Dayton Annunciation parish can help:
