THE TRUE VINE

LENT: THE SCHOOL OF REPENTANCE

The great Orthodox theologian of blessed memory, Fr. Alexander Schmemann, coined lent "The School of Repentance". In Christ's first public teaching he declared, "Repent! The kingdom of God is at hand" (Matthew 4:17). Repentance is not optional because Jesus commands us to do it. The Greek word for repentance is μετάνοια. It means "after/behind one's mind". As such, repentance is the choice to think differently after something negative or damaging has occurred. That "something" is the literal turning away of the mind from those things that harm us and others, and then having the mind seek the goodness of God.

Repentance is a return of the mind to the custody of the Holy Spirit. This is a continual process known as penance. Penance is the intention of doing acts that help us change our minds by developing love for God. The greatest act of penance is the Mystery of Holy Confession. Many saints have taught that without going to Confession salvation is impossible. If we have never gone to Confession, do we want to risk the possibility of losing our immortal souls for the pride of the world, lack of humility, or fear (Mark 8:36)? St. Theophan the Recluse asserts, "If you have sinned, acknowledge the sin and repent. God will forgive the sin and once again give you a new heart...and a new spirit (Ez. 36:26). There is no other way: Either do not sin, or repent."

When we turn away from sin, sin meaning to miss the mark of godliness, we repent or do penance. Repentance is the ability to take the mind from the vain and fleeting pleasures of the world and the gifting of it back to God. Often the word repentance can have a negative connotation. It is easy to conjure up an image of a southern Bible-belt fundamental tent revivalist preacher yelling the word "repent" to a gathered assembly. While this certainly is a call to repentance, the image of it could be pestering for some. As Orthodox Christians, we do not see the call to repentance in this way.

Where the mind goes the heart will follow. Elder Thaddeus of Vitovnica taught "our thoughts determine our lives." St. Paul wrote in his letter to the Romans, "And be not conformed to this world; but be reformed in the newness of your mind, that you may prove what is good, and the acceptable, and the perfect will of God." If our minds cannot become purified through penance, our hearts will never love God as they should. We will never love anyone as we are called to love them by God if our minds do not delight in God's law and love. True love is impossible without the renewal of the mind and the purification of the heart through penance.

We have now entered "The School of Repentance" of Great and Holy Lent where we once again reset and direct our lives towards God's law, love, and forgiveness. It is now the time to make a good Confession and do penance for our sins. It is now the time to come to the weekday services and fervently pray. It is now the time to give to the poor. It is

YOUTH MESSAGE: LAZAROS

On the last Saturday of April we remember a very important day in the life of Christ. It is a day that is often overlooked because of how close it is to Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Pascha. It is the Saturday just before Holy Week and it is a day we remember because it showed the disciples and reminds us that Christ Jesus truly is God.

Jesus had received word, earlier in the week that his good friend Lazaros was sick and dying, but Jesus did not go to Lazaros. In fact Jesus waited 2 days to make his way to his friend and in the time Lazaros did indeed die. When Jesus finally arrived, Lazaros' sister, Martha, said "Lord if you had been here, by brother would not have died." She said this because she knew that Jesus has the ability to heal all types of sicknesses.

However, Jesus knew what he was doing, in fact he waited on purpose. You may think that sounds mean or wrong, but Jesus need to reveal plainly to the people who He really was. You see, the Jewish understanding of what happens when a person dies is, the soul stays with the body of the deceased for 3 days, then leaves for wherever it is headed. By the time Jesus arrived in Bethany, Lazaros had been dead 4 days. This means that all of Jesus' followers believed Lazaros' soul was gone and there was nothing Jesus could do about this.

But Jesus being God, one of the Holy Trinity, called out to Lazaros in the grave and raised him from the dead! This proved to all those watching and even his disciples who may have had a hard time fully understanding who He was, that indeed Christ Jesus is God. Jesus has power over

death, and so when, a week later, the disciples would see that He rose from the dead, they would know it was real, because they had seen this before.

And this is important for us to remember, because He will one day raise us from the dead and we need to see that He has the power to do so. Not only does he have the power to do so, but just as with Lazaros, he has the love to do this, so we can be with Him forever in His Heavenly Kingdom.

I pray I see you all in Church on Saturday April 24th for Divine Liturgy where we celebrate Christ raising Lazaros from the dead, to see Christ's power over death, and to feel the JOY Lazaros' family felt upon his being raised from the dead, knowing that we too will experience that same joy!



AIF SCHOLARSHIP

With Church being shut down for a portion of 2020 and no normal festival or GOYA basketball tournament to earn service and fellowship points for an AIF scholarship, the AIF committee, with the blessing of Father Joseph, has provided the following options for you to gain additional points.



For high school seniors, you can still claim all of the points earned for your junior and seniors years for all events listed in the application. i.e. Catechism attendance, Oratorical Festival, in person Divine Liturgy attendance, etc. Additionally, you have the following options to augment any deficiency:

- Write 12 reflections on sermons from watching our Sunday Divine Liturgy live stream or watch 12 "Be the Bee" videos on YouTube and write reflections on them.
- Complete the high school assignment linked on the website. (read the book *Victory in the Unseen War-fare* by Father Jack N. Sparks and answer all the study questions at the end of each chapter.)
- If you complete either of the writing assignments, ensure you email a copy to Father Joseph (frjoseph@daytonannunciation.org) and Evanthia Valassiades (evalassiades@woh.rr.com) the AIF Chairperson.

For college students. you must complete one of the following:

- A letter from your parish priest verifying your church attendance prior to the church closure will suffice AIF scholarship continuance.
- Participate in OCF with a letter from the OCF chaplain.
- Attended Father Joseph's Zoom seminar that was held in December 2020.
- Read the book The Orthodox Faith: Volume 3 Church History by Father Thomas Hopko and answer all the Study Questions listed on the website (college assignment document).

This has been a very tough year for everyone. Our intent is to provide every opportunity for each and every eligible applicant to earn a scholarship. We are proud of our students and wish you well as you go on to further studies with the foundational religious base you learned from your home and Church.

Our parish's AIF Scholarship is based completely on Church related participation by the student. There are three categories where points can be earned: Spiritual, Fellowship, and Service.
