WE PRAY TO LIVE AND LIVE TO PRAY

A life without prayer is a life that is not being lived fully. As Christians, we are called to be transformed and transfigured through prayer. If we look to the early Church, so many of the saints repeatedly instructed that all Christians must fast and pray to change their lives. It is by daily prayer that we as Christians are sustained spiritually and emotionally. Our immortal souls need this daily communion with the Father, Son, Holy Spirit, angels, and saints. If we don't pray daily we are not being good to ourselves. It's akin to not exercising and caring for our bodies. And while our bodies one day go away at death, our souls live forever. As such, we must take care of them.

Prayer and fasting transform and transfigure us. These acts calm the mind and tame the body. They move the heart to joy, peace, love, and forgiveness. There are many ways to pray. At a minimum, we should say Morning Prayers and Compline (Evening Prayers) from an Orthodox Prayer Book. In addition to this, we should read the daily Epistle and Gospel. We should spend time in the Jesus Prayer as well. If we have children, it is essential that we do these things with them and read Bible stories to them. It is our responsibility to help form the souls that have been entrusted to our care. Again, this is the minimum.

Of course, we should also pray to Jesus extemporaneously where we pour our mind and heart into His. Spending time in complete stillness before the Trinity, while challenging, is powerful. Reading the Book of Psalms or Psalter is a very ancient form of prayer. In the early Church, all monks and nuns had to memorize all 151 Psalms before they could make their final commitment to the monastery. In the liturgical life of the Church, the entire Psalter is read throughout one week. During all of Holy Great Lent, it is read in its entirety twice in one week. The Psalms are considered the heart of the Church's prayer life. Try reading them. They will change your life.

If we don't have a daily prayer rule, we need one. It is important to make a difference in our life by reaching out to the Lord within our minds and hearts. Prayer and fasting must become habits for us. Without them, we miss the true purpose of life. We suffer and others suffer because we don't pray. When we "are not getting anything out of Divine Liturgy", it is probably because we are not receiving the Body and Blood of Christ and then going home to sustain our Holy Communion with daily prayer throughout the week. If our lives are meant to be with Christ in Paradise for all of eternity, we must work towards this fervently every day. All of life is meant for prayer. Small prayer and long prayers. Prayers for our salvation. Prayers for healing. Prayers for deliver-

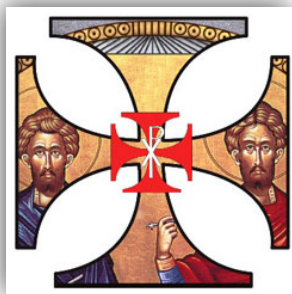

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE BOOKKEEPER

I cannot believe it is summer already. How time seems to just fly by. I say that more and more often the older I get. Fishing is said to be best during the time between a new Moon and a full Moon. This July the Old Farmer's Almanac shows July 9 – July 23 as your best fishing days for the month. Aptly predicted since the New Moon is on July 9 and the Full moon is on July 23rd. So grab a pole, pack a lunch and do some fishing. Don't forget to get a license if you visit any of the State or National Parks.

What's New?

The 4th of July Celebration is going forward this year! Tickets purchased online should be made under the 100 Year Anniversary option. If you send in a check please put “July 4th Tickets” in the memo. Thank you!

Online Donations – How can you help?

Recently I had a conversation with a member of the parish regarding our online donation program. The church uses an outside service to collect all of the monies which are donated through the online program. This is available on the church website under DONATE. But like most things in the world today, there are costs and fees associated with these online donations. They are convenient, to be sure. Anyone with a bank account or credit card can set up an account in which to donate for any number of reasons to the church, including stewardship.

If you set up a donation using the online service and those monies come directly from your checking or savings account there are no fees charged to the church for these types of donations.

On the other hand, if you donate using a credit card the online service charges a fee based on 1) the amount donated and 2) the credit card used. Each credit card company charges different fees with some being more expensive than others. Since it varies it's hard to predict what will be charged, but I can give you a few examples.

- \$300.00 Stewardship Donation less \$7.00 for credit card fees, Net to church \$293.00
- \$10.00 Donation for a 7 Day Candle Purchase less \$0.30 for credit card fees, Net to church \$9.70.

Okay, I know what you may be thinking. It doesn't seem like much. But consider that last month alone there were approximately 95 individual online donations made for various reasons. It adds up. But here's how you can help:

- If you are using a credit card you can change your donation and use your checking or savings account instead.
- If you are using a credit card you can make a separate payment right on the online donations page under “Help Offset The Processing Fees.” A few members already do this by giving an extra \$1.00 to \$5.00
- per transaction. For that we thank you. If you aren't, please consider giving just a small amount to help offset those fees.

A MESSAGE FROM THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

The Stewardship Committee once again thanks all who have signed their 2021 pledge cards and committed to being members in good standing for another year here at Dayton Annunciation. Keeping our parish open and operating at maximum potential is the Stewardship Committee's goal and we encourage you to join us in this mission.

Part of accomplishing this mission is having the building ready for use at all times. This means having electricity, water, gas, internet, trash removal, and the like. Electricity for the parish cost approximately \$18,000 dollars a year or \$1,500 per month. Gas cost around \$2,020 every two months, trash collection about \$1,500 dollars every six months, and \$2,300 on water every six months.*

While for the past 15 months has found most of us participating in Liturgy from home, the church is now back open. In order to but fully functioning these bills along with others, need to be covered. So, whether you've already filled out your pledge card, or have yet to do so, help us cover six months of the water bill, or two months of gas, or even a month of electricity if it is within your means.

We strive to continue to be the Light of Christ in Dayton, the lamp on the hill that will not be covered, and it takes all of us to accomplish this.

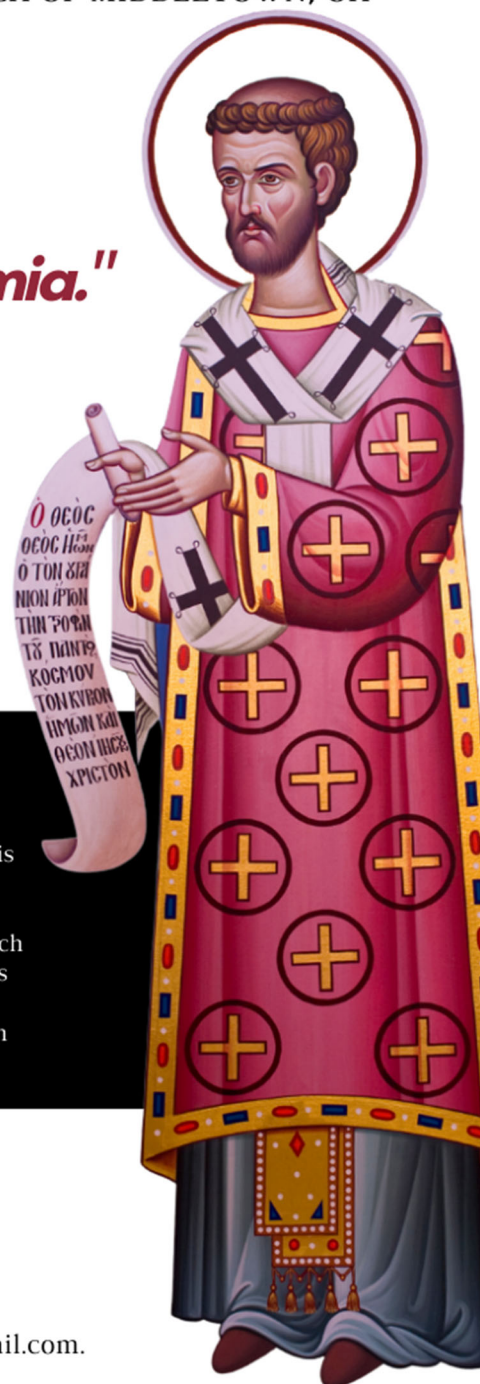
Father Lucas Christensen
