What Monastic and Seminary Life Offer Us in Uncertain Times

One of the most important aspects of life is the establishing of a steady schedule. One of the most important aspects of adapting to a new way of life is to be found in finding a rhythm and a routine to best adapt and excel in newfound circumstances. Two of the best examples that come to mind are the military and monastic life. In both examples, a man or woman enters a different and challenging new way of life and comes out a better person. In the military and the monastic life, individuals adapt to a regimented and set way of life where a routine is used for the transformation of the entire self.

I was never in the military but I did live in a monastery for 2.5 years. I also lived in a traditional all men's seminary akin to what one would find in the early 1960's Roman Catholic seminaries for 3 years. I found that in the "monotony" of daily monastic and traditional seminary life there is a grace-filled rhythm that leads to liberation and growth if we allow it. I also know the structure of theses institutions is very different from the way most people live in the world. Right now, we all find ourselves thrust into a very different lifestyle. As such, I believe those treasures found in monastic and seminary life offer us a chance to adapt and find a place to grow and experience some tranquility during a time of great difficulty.

Monastic life is not for the faint-hearted and neither are these days we find ourselves in. Monastic life is hard and all of us are experiencing many hardships right now. In the monastery, one must accept the circumstances he finds himself in as necessary for his salvation and the salvation of his brother or sister monks. A selfish and non-sacrificial monastic makes for a terrible monk! The same could certainly be said about us as Christians living in the world right now. During times of hardship is precisely the time we must think of others. It feels good to give.

In the monastery, you get up at the same time, go to the same scheduled services, and do the same obediences (jobs) every single day. There is no thought as to what your day will be like. It is the same regiment and routine over and over again without television, radio, or surfing the Internet. My day would begin at 4:00 am in my cell (room) with a few private prayers. I would then go to the church for Midnight Office. As the main cook, I was exempted from Matins and Divine Liturgy because I had to prepare breakfast Monday through Friday. As soon as breakfast was over, I began making lunch which was the main meal. After lunch, I would have downtime to complete my cell rule of prayer, do my assigned spiritual reading, personal laundry, or take a hike. Dinner was a light meal and usually a repeat of lunch so it was easy to prepare. I would be heating it during Vespers which I was also exempt from due to my kitchen obedience. After Vespers, I would then go to the monastic chapel where all the brotherhood would gather for Compline and then we went into grand silence until the next day.

I must confess that this was one of the happiest times in my life so far. I was content. There was comfort and peace that came from totally surrendering my life and will to Christ through my spiritual father. While there was nothing easy about my life in the monastery, there was a joy that came from it. The rhythm and "monotony" of monastic life allowed the Lord to help transform me in ways that had never occurred before. I wish I could go to a monastery a few times a year for 5 days each visit in order to reset and recharge spiritually.

Like monks, we have been thrust into isolation with our immediate family members. While there are many blessings in being close to them, there is a difficulty as well. Family life has many blessings but it is not always easy. The same goes for the seclusiveness of monastic life. If we want to be successful and experience moments of joy, we must

Young at Heart: Becky Heddings Mary McDonald Toni Moraites develop a routine and a rhythm to life in our new found circumstances. What we can't do is give in to despair.

For at least five days of the week get up at the same time and pray at the same time. Make sure you shower and still look presentable. In the seminary, we were not allowed to have our hair touch our collar. We were not allowed to grow facial hair until ordained a deacon and our beards were to be short. We had a strict dress code at all times. All meals were obligatory to foster a sense of unity in us as brother future priests. We were to care for ourselves in order to care for others. During this time of sequestering, even if we have no one to see but our family, we should still take a sense of pride in ourselves and our appearance. We should schedule chores (obediences) for all of us to do in the home to contribute to the greater good of our house church. We should sit down to meals together and engage one another just like in the monastery and seminary. In seminary, unlike the monastery, we had time for recreation. Schedule time to play games or go on a walk. Having a set and a fixed routine forces us to not succumb to despondency. The routine and the rhythm of a regimented life will help us get through all of this. In all things, we should work our schedules around our morning and evening prayers just like in the monastery and seminary.

Prayer is a cure for anxiety. The Jesus Prayer or the Prayer of the Heart has been known to bring peace and serenity upon many a suffering soul. All we need to do is pick up our prayer rope and say internally or audibly "Lord Jesus Christ have mercy on me." We should do this for at least 10 to 15 minutes a day in the beginning and then build upon it. St. Theophan the Recluse said, "The heart is but a small vessel, and yet dragons and lions are there, and there poisonous creatures and all the treasures of wickedness; rough, uneven paths are there, and gaping chasms. There likewise is God, there are the angels, the heavenly cities and the treasures of grace; all things are there." My spiritual father told me that the Jesus Prayer can take us to Paradise in all circumstances. This is why the saints in the gulag and martyrdom had so much peace. Their hearts and souls were already in Paradise. Amid extreme and dire circumstances those Christians acquired the peace that surpasses all understanding. This is the only panacea for our current circumstances as individuals and a nation. We must make our hearts blossom and flower like the gardens of Paradise.

Lastly, in times of uncertainty, we must create the certainty we so desire in our daily lives. Peace comes from within and then goes out of our hearts into others. We can do this by doing all the same things we do every day with the intent to offer the totality of our lives and actions as a sacrifice of thanksgiving to the Lord. In this time of isolation, we should strive to make our homes more of a house church and enter into a type of monastic rhythm where we create order out of the chaos for our spiritual well being.

CCM (Community Care Ministry) April CCM: Oasis House. Over the past several years, our National Philoptochos has worked extensively to educate and develop awareness of


