The Problem of Science Without Metaphysics

We live in a world where science and metaphysics are no longer used together for the betterment of society.

What is the definition of science? Science is the intellectual and practical activity encompassing the systematic study of the structure and behavior of the physical and natural world through observation and experiment. Due to this, many scientists hold the firm opinion that nothing of a supernatural nature belongs in science.

What is the definition of supernatural? The supernatural is a manifestation or event attributed to some force beyond scientific understanding or the laws of nature.

Here a problem arises because as conscious beings we have free will. Human life is not wholly deterministic in the same way that a machine is. The sciences that study unconscious things are referred to as hard sciences and the sciences that study human behavior such as psychology and sociology are called soft or approximate sciences.

With all this said, hard science, soft science, history, philosophy, and religion all tell us that science cannot fully describe reality or consciousness. Science is limited because we live in a bi-dimensional universe that is both physical and metaphysical. Science itself is limited by its own rules as it cannot study the metaphysical dimension of reality. Thus if consciousness itself proves to be a metaphysical entity neither hard sciences like neurology or soft sciences like psychology can ultimately give a complete explanation of consciousness.

So what is the metaphysical realm? Let us first ask some important metaphysical questions: Does God exist? Do humans have free will? Are there objective moral facts. All these are familiar metaphysical questions. The great Greek philosopher Aristotle used the term metaphysics in first philosophy that he also described as theology because he considered God to be the unmoved mover. The Stanford Encyclopedia of Philosophy accepts "That the question of whether the mind is a material mechanism subject to deterministic laws or whether it is something else comprised of free will is a metaphysical issue." The Stanford Encyclopedia of Philosophy also declares the following philosophical problems to be a metaphysical problem that it describes as "The problem of free will."

Today in so many of our public universities we are seeing scholars in physical sciences make negative metaphysical claims. This is completely illogical as it breaks the very rules governing hard science. In full disclosure, I love the hard sciences. I'm very happy there are dentists, doctors, and pharmacists. The relief they bring all of us from our deep pain and suffering we should be grateful for. Science intellectually enriches our lives and has saved us from religious fanaticism. Yet some in science today are bordering on their own forms of fanaticism in the academy.

Our Declaration of Independence declared it a self-evident truth that all men are created equal by their Creator. Aristotle defined a self-evident truth as a truth that doesn't have to be proven as true through an infinite amount of regressions. For example, it is a self-evident truth that water boils at 100 C or 212 F. Thus our Democratic Republic is based on the wholly unscientific metaphysical foundational assumption that it is a self-evident truth that all men are created equal by their Creator and endowed with unalienable rights. Metaphysics are essential to equality and survival as an intelligent species with moral free will. Not one of us is neurologically wired to believe in fairytales. As such, we should believe in self and other selves and God from the standpoint of metaphysics. This is why

we can say as humans genocide is evil and never good. Hard science can only describe the facts that a holocaust occurred. Only the non-scientific metaphysical assumption and self-evident truth that all men are created equal can tell us why the Holocaust was evil. Genocide is not a fairytale and we can know this objectively only through metaphysical ethics.

We live in a world of metaphysical facts where we see racism, sexism, good and evil, and we see and observe these realities as real. Through metaphysical ethics, we get a true and objective sense of moral absolutes. If a metaphysical reality is given up on and metaphysical assumptions are abandoned and one develops a pure materialist philosophy all manner of evil is justifiable. The materialist philosopher or atheist could simply reason that social Darwinism and survival of the fittest are good things without metaphysics because no objective right or wrong behavior can exist in a one-dimensional universe. If one is a materialist this is the ultimate world they believe in when taken to its logical conclusion. Most materialists don't though, and that is why they are philosophical hypocrites. One can also find many college professors today who will assert that "There are no great truths." This, however, is philosophical madness because if one asserts "There are no great truths," this is a great truth assertion itself. One of the hallmarks of many professors in higher education is the ability to contradict themselves. This level of academic and intellectual hypocrisy is no longer a problem today, but it should be.

Metaphysics and physics must learn to work together again for the goodness of humanity. Galileo said, "The Bible tells you how to go to heaven but not how the heavens go." There is no contradiction between metaphysics and physics if people allow both to work in reality. Why do some religious believers slaughter those who refuse to convert to their faith, refuse scientific evidence for an ancient universe, or hold God to be an utterly arbitrary being? Why do some scientists believe that universes pop into existence from nothing, that aliens seeded life on earth, or that fish turn into reptiles by chance processes? The answer, for both, is the same: the abandonment of realism, the human way of knowing reality.
